2023 ANNUAL REPORT

Council Report

The Church Council met regularly throughout the year and was delighted to welcome two new members, Elaine Bennett, and Steve Stuart. We thank Sean Nouvel, Rich Armell, and Cathy Street who stepped down in 2022 for their service.

Among many matters addressed, the Council updated the Funeral and Property Rental policies and established short term task forces to make recommendations on needed technology upgrades and a review of the Pastor's compensation to align with Synod guidelines. We approved a special appeal for a new Clavinova (piano.) and discussed Christian education, special services, spiritual growth activities (such as Forward in Faith and Lenten suppers), and congregational caregiving needs with the Pastor.

The council frequently addressed the need to recruit individuals to serve as volunteers for Sunday worship as well as assist with bulletins and other administrative duties. The guide for worship assistants was updated and requests for volunteers were made through the church newsletter.

In an effort to be visible in the community, additional resources and time were committed to advertise events at Prince of Peace through local newspapers and the Bryce Resort newsletter. The Church also hosted a table at the resort's holiday craft fair and plans to participate in the July 2023 Bryce Fest. Our website was refreshed regularly with updated schedules and information, thanks to volunteer Scott Hofmann.

Council nominated two individuals to represent Prince of Peace at the June 2023 Synod Assembly in which a new bishop will be elected – Ann Davison and Steve Stuart. Those nominations will be voted on during the 2023 Congregational meeting.

Finance Committee Report

A budget has been prepared which the Financial Committee discussed on 25 March, and which, in their April 23rd meeting the Council recommended be approved. This includes the Pastor's

compensation package recommended by the Compensation review committee and the recent increase in pianist compensation directed by the Council.

Currently we are on track to come close to our budget estimate for 22/23, with an expected deficit of \$11,700, based on the shortfall of pledges received last year. Expenses have been somewhat higher than budgeted, but non-pledged giving has exceeded our expectations to offset some of the impact of higher spending.

As you can see, the proposed budget calls for a significant increase in spending for the new fiscal year, with very little room to economize. Most income items other than the pledge goal are estimated based on previous history. If we were to receive a pledging total equal to what was pledged for 22-23, we would fall over \$27,000 short of expected expenses.

As you can see, we can sustain that much of a deficit for maybe two, possibly three years but that would draw down our assets to the point where we would have to consider other options. It is the opinion of the Financial Committee that the time to begin investigating and considering those options is before we have reached the point that we have none remaining.

Stewardship Committee

In preparation for the Stewardship campaign, committee members participated in a Synod-sponsored series of workshops on how to help our Congregation fully live into God's abundance. The annual stewardship campaign was conducted in May and June of 2023. Several members of the Congregation shared stories about their Prince of Peace experience in Sunday services and in the weekly updates including Farley, Monika, and Pat. Two letters were sent to the congregation – one by U.S. mail and the second by email – setting a goal is for all households involved in the life of the church to make a pledge for 2022-2023 and to grow giving as an entire congregation by \$500/month. The members of the Stewardship Committee pledged to increase their giving by 15% and asked the Congregation to consider a similar increase.

Additionally, the opportunity was made for individuals to begin giving online through a Synod-endorsed online donation platform.

Pledges were made by 24 individuals and families totaling \$92,220, an increase of nearly \$5,000 above the previous year's pledged amount of \$87,387. (Note that pledge amount reflects additional pledges received outside of the Spring Stewardship campaign but during the budget year.)

Worship and Music

In addition to traditional Sunday worship services, this year we held several additional services including an October Blessing of the Animals held at the Resort, a November Service of Thanksgiving honoring veterans, and a December "Blue Christmas" service. Online broadcasts of Sunday services were continued to enable worshippers to join us virtually.

We were delighted to welcome Karen Schmitt as our accompanist and appreciate the other talented musicians who frequently supported our worship services including Barbara Strong, Susan Edelman, and Joe Kittle. The tone chimes continued providing beautiful music for special services.

The Council authorized a special appeal to fund a replacement of our Clavinova which was beyond repair. The congregation responded generously, and we were able to inaugurate a new instrument during Holy Week and Easter.

During the course of the year the Committee also purchased new linens for the altar and music books for our piano and guitar accompanists.

Church Library

The purpose of the Prince of Peace library is to make available to members of the congregation and to local residents materials relevant for religious study, spiritual growth and church based education.

During fiscal year 2022-2023, the library added 21 new books and now has a total of 815 catalogued items. This increase was due to generous book donations by Diane Hanson and Faye Williamsen and book purchases using the Prince of Peace library budget. There was also a modest increase this past year in checkouts from the library due in large part to Pastor Hofmann's use of library materials in her various Bible study programs.

Special thanks to Marty Harding for donating her bookshelves to the church library and thereby facilitating an expanded display of library books in Stidley Hall.

Members of the church are encouraged to make use of the library materials as well as provide suggestions for purchase and feedback to the church librarian.

Social Ministry Committee

Over the course of the year, the Social Ministry Committee continued fulfilling our role of facilitating opportunities for members of Prince of Peace to respond to needs outside of the church walls in our local and global community. During the summer of 2022, in lieu of the annual "Drop Your Drawers" campaign, we joined with WECA to collect socks for donation to local nonprofits that support families in need.

In late November the Congregation participated in the Empty Stocking Fund, fulfilling the Christmas wishes of 10 girls and boys.

Committee and church members remain active in the Shenandoah Valley Lutheran Ministries efforts including ongoing collection of items for Luke's Backpack and managing the inventory, packing, and dissemination of household items for the Good Shepherd Ministry that are distributed to local seniors in need.

During the 2023 Lent season, we collected essential items for 36 Personal Care Kits to be disseminated by Lutheran World Relief

The Good Samaritan Fund

The Good Samaritan Fund was established in September 2013 after an anonymous donor contributed a substantial sum of money. The Fund is governed by the policies and procedures set forth by the congregation. A Good Samaritan Fund Committee, appointed by the Church Council, fields requests for assistance and monitors the needs of our community.

The direction for the Fund comes from Christ himself who has challenged us to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, welcome the stranger, visit the prisoner and heal the sick. The Committee's mission is to respond to God's call to help those with needs in our congregation and in our local community.

The Fund has disbursed over \$88,000 and currently has a balance of \$31,600.96 thanks to fundraisers and donations.

Since last May we have helped recipients pay heating and electric bills. We continue to help one individual with car insurance payments. One family was helped with the cost of rehab care after a hospitalization and also helped to pay for prescription medications. The fund has also helped with rent payments.

The primary goal of the Fund for the coming year is to raise awareness of the availability of funds to help those in need. In this, we need your help. If you know someone who needs help with medical bills, credit card debt, car repairs or replacement, or has other financial needs, tell

them about the Good Samaritan Fund. We are here to help our neighbors in the community, not just members of Prince of Peace.

The committee expresses its appreciation to the initial donor and subsequent donors and hopes that others will prayerfully consider supporting the fund in the future.

Property Support Committee

- A. <u>Hose Bib</u> Hose bib between the Sanctuary and Stidley Hall replaced in May 2022. The old hose bib was leaking and could not be repaired.
- B. Emergency and Exit Lights-Replaced all batteries in lights in May 2022.
- C. <u>Thermostats</u>— Two new thermostats replaced in Stidley Hall. The new thermostats are Wi-Fi enabled and provide the capability to change settings remotely using an app. Work completed December 2022.
- D. <u>HVAC Units</u>—All HVAC units were serviced April 2023 by Mountain Valley Home Comfort under our annual service contract. All units were found to be working satisfactorily and no repairs were carried out. The A/C unit for the Sanctuary was installed in 1997 and has obsolete freon. Any significant problem with this unit will require replacement of the entire system. At this time, the unit is working fine, but we must be prepared for a \$11K to \$15K cost for a new unit.
- E. <u>Spring 2023 Spruce-Up</u> A number of projects have been identified for the outside grounds. As of this report, several projects have been completed. Our goal is to complete all work prior to Memorial Day. Those who are able and willing to help are encouraged to volunteer.

That project includes making bears for counselors to use when working with children who have been abused.

The women of the church made and served breakfast at the Lions Club meetings twice a month to benefit the church budget. Our community outreach this year also included the annual fall and spring Spaghetti Dinners co-hosted with the Lions Club of Basye/Bryce. The annual Ruritan dinner was served at their meeting in October. Funds from that enabled us to donate money to

the Orkney Fire and Rescue and Response. Something special for Father's Day will round out our year.

Committee Decisions

- The committee decided to provide a footstone for the Bowers family as the parents, Bill and Kay, and all three of their children are deceased. The two gravesites (23B and 23C) are the resting spot for the whole family, but no clear markings for the children are on the monuments the family had installed. The committee approved the purchase of the footstone for \$125 with all three children's names and birth year and death year. The stone has been installed.
- We provided information to the "Wreaths Across America" of our veterans. The hope is that this Christmas we will receive wreaths for their gravesites.

Action Items for 2023-24

• Cemetery Annual Fund Appeal – The appeal never came to fruition this past year. Currently, we have operating funds available for the next two years because of the sale of plots and donations. There are no immediate plans for this appeal.

- The committee needs to draft a regulation to establish a policy for succession of ownership in the event of the owner's death and the process to follow when a plot is unclaimed and no heirs can be identified. These additions to the regulations will be presented to the congregation at a future annual meeting for approval.
- Working on methods to maintain monuments that have darkened or are growing lichens and such.
- Need to recruit an additional member for our committee.
- Continue flag placement on veterans' graves on Memorial Day, Independence Day, and Veteran's Day.
